FINAL RITES TODAY FOR OLIVER RICHEY

Lifelong Resident of Rush County Dies Sunday at Residence North of Homer.

FORMERLY OPERATED SAWMILL AT MILROY

Services for Oliver Perry Morton Richey, 70, life-long resident of Rush county who expired suddenly at his home, two miles north of Homer, Sunday morning, were held at 1:30 p. m. today at the late residence. The Rev. R. E. Badger, Methodist minister of Milroy, was in charge and burial was made in the Milroy cemetery.

Mr. Richey died at 8 a. m. Sunday after being stricken two hours earlier in the yard of his home. A hemorrhage of the brain was given as the cause of death.

The deceased was born in Milroy October 25, 1865 and he had lived all of his life in Rush

IT'S SIMPLE WITH NEW CAMERA---1 MINUTE FROM SNAP TO SNAPSHOT



75 Years Ago

TAKING PICTURES requires only a minute or so from snap to print with this new-type camera. You just insert the film roll (left), slip the picture (second left) with a shutter speed and lens opening, a corporation. Then leader of film is pulled out (second right) and torn off. After a one-minute wait, out comes a finished print (right). The camera is simple to use and is available in 16mm, 35mm and 65mm sizes. Tests indicate the print type, says maker, (International)

THE VERDICT.
The verdict against Boss Tweed, the notorious leader of the Tammany Democracy, seems to meet with almost universal satisfaction. He has been pronounced guilty on two hundred and four counts of the indictment.

Few there were who had dared to indulge the hope of such a conspicuous vindication as the result of the trial afforded. The general sentiment of the public has been since the inauguration of the criminal proceedings against Tweed, that with the vast wealth at his disposal, and the

plunders having been at last brought to bay, should have excited feelings of triumph.

What will be his sentence determined. He was ordered to go to the stocks, but afterwards to go in custody of Sheriff until Friday, when, unless by stay of proceedings, he will be sentenced to the penitentiary. Lawyers differ, but it is generally believed that he can be sentenced 102 1/2 years each, besides 102 fines of \$1000 each. Undoubtedly he will receive from fifteen to twenty years.
